

The Economic Value of Finger Lakes Community College





The college plays a key role in helping students increase their employability and achieve their individual potential. The college draws students to the region, generating new dollars and opportunities for the Finger Lakes Region. FLCC provides students with the education, training, and skills they need to have fulfilling and prosperous careers. Furthermore, FLCC is a place for students to meet new people, increase their self-confidence, and promote their overall health and well-being.

FLCC influences both the lives of its students and the regional economy. The college supports a variety of industries in the Finger Lakes Region, serves regional businesses, and benefits society as a whole in New York from an expanded economy and improved quality of life. Additionally, the benefits created by FLCC extend to the state and local government through increased tax revenues and public sector savings.

This study measures the economic impacts created by FLCC on the business community and the benefits the college generates in return for the investments made by its key stakeholder groups—students, taxpayers, and society. The following two analyses are presented:



Economic impact analysis



Investment analysis

All results reflect employee, student, and financial data, provided by the college, for fiscal year (FY) 2020-21. Impacts on the Finger Lakes Region economy are reported under the economic impact analysis and are measured in terms of added income. The returns on investment to students, taxpayers, and society in New York are reported under the investment analysis.

For the purposes of this analysis, the Finger Lakes Region is comprised of Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Seneca, Steuben, Wayne, and Yates Counties.

Economic impact analysis



FLCC promotes economic growth in the Finger Lakes Region through its direct expenditures and the resulting expenditures of students and regional businesses. The college serves as an employer and buyer of goods and services for its day-to-day and construction operations. The college's activities attract students from outside the Finger Lakes Region, whose expenditures benefit regional vendors. In addition, FLCC is a primary source of higher education to the Finger Lakes Region residents and a supplier of trained workers to regional industries, enhancing overall productivity in the regional workforce.

Operations spending impact

FLCC adds economic value to the Finger Lakes Region as an employer of regional residents and a large-scale buyer of goods and services. In FY 2020-21, the college employed 476 full-time and part-time faculty and staff, 75% of whom lived in the Finger Lakes Region. Total payroll at FLCC was \$33.7 million, much of which was spent in the region for groceries, mortgage and rent payments, dining out, and other household expenses. In addition, the college spent \$14.1 million on day-to-day expenses related to facilities, supplies, and professional services.

FLCC's day-to-day operations spending added \$35.4 million in income to the region during the analysis year. This figure represents the college's payroll, the multiplier effects generated by the in-region spending of the college and its employees, and a downward adjustment to account for funding that the college received from regional sources. The \$35.4 million in added income is equivalent to supporting 464 jobs in the region.

Construction spending impact

FLCC invests in construction each year to maintain its facilities, create additional capacities, and meet its growing educational demands. While the amount varies from year to year, these quick infusions of income and jobs have a substantial impact on the regional economy. In FY 2020-21, FLCC's construction spending generated \$1.7 million in added income, which is equivalent to supporting 19 jobs.

Student spending impact

Around 10% of students attending FLCC originated from outside the region in FY 2020-21, and some of these students relocated to the Finger Lakes Region to attend FLCC. These students may not have come to the region if the college

did not exist. In addition, some in-region students, referred to as retained students, would have left the Finger Lakes Region if not for the existence of FLCC. While attending the college, these relocated and retained students spent money on groceries, accommodation, transportation, and other household expenses. This spending generated \$5 million in added income for the regional economy in FY 2020-21, which supported 74 jobs in the Finger Lakes Region.

Alumni impact

The education and training FLCC provides for regional residents has the greatest impact. Since the establishment of the college, students have studied at FLCC and entered the regional workforce with greater knowledge and new skills. Today, thousands of former FLCC students are employed in the Finger Lakes Region. As a result of their education from FLCC, the students receive higher earnings and increase the productivity of the businesses that employ them. In FY 2020-21, FLCC alumni generated \$155.8 million in added income for the regional economy, which is equivalent to supporting 1,853 jobs.

Total impact

FLCC added \$1979 million in income to the Finger Lakes Region economy during the analysis year, equal to the sum of the operations and construction spending impacts; the student spending impact; and the alumni impact. This contribution that the college provided on its own is nearly as large as the entire Hotels and Motels industry in the region.

FLCC's total impact can also be expressed in terms of jobs supported. The \$197.9 million impact supported 2,411 regional jobs, using the jobs-to-sales ratios specific to each industry in the region. In addition, the \$197.9 million, or 2,411 supported jobs, stemmed from different industry sectors. For instance, among non-education industry sectors, FLCC's

industry sector supported 413 jobs in FY 2020-21. If the college did not exist, these impacts would not have been generated in the Finger Lakes Region.

Investment analysis



An investment analysis evaluates the costs associated with a proposed venture against its expected benefits. If the benefits outweigh the costs, then the investment is financially worthwhile. The analysis presented here considers FLCC as an investment from the perspectives of students, taxpayers, and society in New York.

Student perspective

In FY 2020-21, FLCC served 5,414 credit and 511 non-credit students. In order to attend the college, the students paid for tuition, fees, books, and supplies.

They also took out loans and will incur interest on those loans. Additionally, students gave up money they would have otherwise earned had they been working instead of attending college. The total investment made by FLCC's students in FY 2020-21 amounted to a present value of \$25.4 million, equal to \$13.6 million in out-of-pocket expenses (including future principal and interest on student loans) and \$11.8 million in forgone time and money.

In return for their investment, FLCC's students will receive a stream of higher future earnings that will continue to grow throughout their working lives. For example, the average FLCC associate degree graduate from FY 2020-21 will see annual earnings that are \$7,300 higher than a person with a high school diploma or equivalent working in New York. Over a working lifetime, the benefits of the associate degree over a high school diploma will amount to an undiscounted value of \$313.9 thousand in higher earnings per graduate. The present value of the cumulative higher future earnings that FLCC's FY 2020-21 students will receive over their working careers is \$123.6 million.

The students' benefit-cost ratio is 4.9. In other words, for every dollar students invest in FLCC in the form of out-of-pocket expenses and forgone time and money, they will receive a cumulative value of \$4.90 in higher future earnings. Annually, the students' investment in FLCC has an average annual internal rate of return of 17.5%, which is impressive compared to the U.S. stock market's 30-year average rate of return of 10.5%. 

Taxpayer perspective

FLCC generates more in tax revenue than it takes. These benefits to taxpayers consist primarily of taxes that the state and local government will collect from the added revenue created in the state. As FLCC students will earn more, they will make higher tax payments throughout their working lives. Students' employers will also make higher tax payments as they increase their output and purchases of goods and services. By the end of the FY 2020-21 students' working lives, the state and

local government will have collected a present value of \$51.7 million in added taxes.

Benefits to taxpayers will also consist of savings generated by the improved lifestyles of FLCC students and the corresponding reduced government services. Education is statistically correlated with a variety of lifestyle changes. The educations that

FLCC students receive will generate savings in three main categories: 1) healthcare, 2) justice system, and 3) income assistance. Improved health will lower students' demand for national health care services. In addition, costs related to the justice system will decrease. FLCC students will be more employable, so their reduced demand for income assistance such as welfare and unemployment benefits will benefit taxpayers. Altogether, the present value of the benefits associated with an education from FLCC will generate \$6.7 million in savings to state and local taxpayers.

Total taxpayer benefits amount to \$58.4 million, the present value sum of the added taxes and public sector savings. Taxpayer costs are \$24.3 million, equal to the amount of state and local government funding FLCC received in FY 2020-21. These benefits and costs yield a benefit-cost ratio of 2.4. This means that for every dollar of public money invested in FLCC in FY 2020-21, taxpayers will receive a cumulative present value of \$2.40 over the course of the students' working lives. The average annual internal rate of return for taxpayers is 4.8%, which compares favorably to other longterm investments in the public and private sectors.

Social perspective

Society as a whole in New York benefits from the presence of FLCC in two major ways. Primarily, society benefits from an increased economic base in the state. This is attributed to the added income from students' increased lifetime earnings (added student income) and increased business output (added business income), which raise economic prosperity in New York.

Benefits to society also consist of the savings generated by the improved lifestyles of FLCC students. As discussed in the previous section, education is statistically correlated with a variety of lifestyle changes that generate social savings. Note that these costs are avoided by the consumers but are distinct from the costs avoided


by the taxpayers outlined above. Healthcare savings include avoided medical costs associated with smoking, alcohol dependence, obesity, drug abuse, and depression. Justice system savings include avoided costs to the government and society due to less judicial activity. Income assistance savings include reduced welfare and unemployment claims. Altogether, the social benefits of FLCC equal a present value of \$555.2 million. These benefits include \$344.4 million in added student income, \$154.6 million in added business income, \$43.6 million in added income from college activities, as well as \$12.6 million in social savings related to health, crime, and income assistance in New York. People in New York invested a present value total of \$68.9 million in FLCC in FY 2020-21. The cost includes all the college and student costs.

The benefit-cost ratio for society is 8.1, equal to the \$555.2 million in benefits divided by the \$68.9 million in costs. In other words, for every dollar invested in FLCC, people in New York will receive a cumulative value of \$8.10 in benefits. The benefits of this investment will occur for as long as FLCC's FY 2020-21 students remain employed in the state workforce.

Summary of investment analysis results

The results of the analysis demonstrate that FLCC is a strong investment for all three major stakeholder groups-students, taxpayers, and society. As shown, students receive a great return for their investments in an education from FLCC. At the same time, taxpayers' investment in FLCC returns more to government budgets than it costs and creates a wide range of social benefits throughout New York.

FLCC enriches the lives of students by raising their lifetime earnings and helping them achieve their individual potential. The college benefits state and local taxpayers through increased tax receipts and a reduced demand for government-supported social services. Finally, FLCC benefits society as a whole in New York by creating a more prosperous economy and generating a variety of savings through the improved lifestyles of students.
